### Sustainability Makes Sense and Saves Cents

How do you define "sustainability?" For Leon County, it means, in formal terms, "Meeting the needs of the present without impacting the ability for future generations to meet their own needs."

Maggie Theriot, manager of Leon County's Office of Sustainability, translates this into some down-to-earth advice. For her, sustainability means "being more efficient with the resources we have." So what can you do to maintain the quality of Leon County's--and Planet Earth's-future? And how can Leon County help you do it?

"Our programs pertain to anyone who consumes our planet's resources," Maggie says, "so everyone can make an impact." And the great thing is that many strategies for saving our planet also save money. Just one of Leon County's energy reduction projects has already saved \$1.7 million.

Sometime the simplest things save the most energy. For example, caulking and weatherstripping can pay for themselves in energy savings within a year, and they also make your home more comfortable by blocking drafts, according to the U.S. Department of

Energy.


LEAP--the Leon Energy Assistance Program, which will get started soon-will help property owners finance energy efficiency improvements. The program will cover many kinds of improvement projects,

from weatherstripping windows to upgrading insulation to installing solar photovoltaic panels. Property owners in Leon County who meet certain criteria--and who are not City of Tallahassee utilities customers--will be eligible. Contact the Leon County Office of Sustainability at 606-5300

to find out more. People with low incomes (200 percent of poverty) can qualify for weatherization assistance through the Capital Area Community Action Agency (222-2043).

Leon County is also changing its ways to reduce carbon emissions and conserve resources (including tax dollars). Since the Office of Sustainability was created two years ago, Maggie Theriot's immediate goal has been "to get our own house in order," she says. "I believe strongly that if we are going to suggest to others changes they should make in their own lives or (Continued on page 3)

#### Sunshine Sweet Potatoes

Yield: 6 servings
2 pounds sweet potatoes,
1/4 cup orange juice

1 tablespoon orange zest (grated peel)
1 tablespoon lemon zest (grated peel)

1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon salt (or less, to taste)

1/8 teaspoon pepper (white pepper if you have it)

Peel sweet potatoes and cut into 1-inch cubes. Place sweet potatoes in a large saucepan and add enough water to cover. Bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat to medium, cover and cook until tender, about 10 minutes. Drain sweet potatoes and cool. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Transfer sweet potatoes to a large bowl. Using a potato masher or a fork, mash sweet potatoes until smooth.

In a small saucepan, combine honey, orange juice, orange zest, lemon zest, nutmeg, salt and pepper. Bring mixture to a boil over medium heat, stirring to melt the honey. Remove from heat. Stir honey mixture into sweet potatoes. Spoon mixture into a 1-quart casserole. Bake until heated through, about 20 to 25 minutes.

businesses, then the County should certainly practice what we preach." So far, Maggie has spent most of her time finding ways to save energy and water and reduce waste for Leon County's 800 employees, 1.3 million square feet of office space, and 200 vehicles. As she gets the county squared away, Maggie's focus will shift more toward community outreach. Look for Maggie at a Senior Day soon.

Meanwhile, keep in mind that "frugal" and "fruitful" come from the same ancient root word. We can save money, take care of the planet, and live well all at the same time.

#### Steps to Sustainability

- · Use nontoxic cleaning products.
- Recycle as much as possible. The rules are simple. Just about anything made of paper can be recycled **except** paper used for food (such as paper plates and napkins and paper food and drink boxes). Recyclable containers include aluminum and steel cans, and plastic and glass bottles and jars. Everything else goes in the trash. (Don't forget to shred bills and all documents that show account numbers or your Social Security number.)
- Donate your unneeded clothing, appliances, household items, or furniture to a re-sale shop. Some will pick up large items.
- Grow some of your own food—on your windowsill, in your yard, or in a community garden.
- Use slow-release fertilizer on your garden and lawn to help keep our lakes, rivers, and streams clean.
- Shop for locally produced goods, which don't require as much fuel consumption to reach the store and which support our local economy.
- Promote re-use by buying at consignment or second-hand stores.
- Combine as many errands as possible into one trip to save gas.
- Avoid products that use a lot of plastic packaging, and avoid Styrofoam.
- Request mail-order stores to stop sending catalogs you don't want.
- · Bring your own bags when you shop.
- · Plug small appliances and chargers into power

- strips with on/off switches, and turn them off when you're not using them.
- Consider EnergyStar rated models when it's time to replace an appliance. For toilets, water heaters, showerheads, look for WaterSenselabeled products.

#### Community Gardens Thrive

Community
gardens are springing
up all over Leon
County. There's one
in the works in the
Miccosukee area, and
in Fort Braden, the
garden is nearly in
full bloom.

Fort Braden resident and lifelong gardener Dorothy Carr's beautiful winter garden has spinach, beets, broccoli, strawberries, more beets, parsnips (an experiment), and still more beets. The Fort Braden community garden, which is right



behind the branch library on Highway 20, is a  $100 \times 200$  foot area surrounded with an eightfoot-high wire fence to keep deer out, with neatly mulched walkways separating the  $15 \times 15$  foot plots. The garden offers water spigots, wheelbarrows, compost bins, rain barrels, a mulch pile ("We've got mulch coming out our ears," Dorothy says), and a covered pavilion for breaks in the shade.

Each plot rents for \$30 a year, and renters agree to contribute at least two hours on a garden work day. They also promise to abide by garden rules, which include a ban on inorganic chemical pesticides and herbicides.
